



Keeping Your Child Safe Online

A Parent's Tip Sheet for Roblox, Snapchat & TikTok

This tip sheet focuses on the highly popular Apps **Roblox, Snapchat & TikTok** and provides **simple, effective steps** you can take **today** to help your child stay safe **without cutting them off from their digital world**.



Roblox – Online Games & Virtual Worlds



Risks:

- Strangers can send messages or friend requests
- Some games include adult or scary content
- Robux (game currency) spending adds up fast
- In-game chat can be misused



What You Can Do:

- Turn on **“Account Restrictions”** in settings (limits content)
 - Use a **Parent PIN** to lock safety settings
 - **Disable chat** unless your child needs it
 - Monitor their **game list** and **friend requests**
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Snapchat – Disappearing Messages



Risks:

- Messages disappear quickly — hard to monitor
- “Snap Map” shares your child’s live location
- Peer pressure from streaks, sexting or bullying
- Strangers can message your child unless restricted



What You Can Do:

- **Enable Ghost Mode** to hide location
- Change privacy settings to **“Friends Only”**
- **Turn off Quick Add** (prevents random adds)
- Talk about responsible photo/video sharing

TikTok – Short Videos, Big Influence

Risks:

- Harmful trends or unsafe challenges
- Algorithm may suggest adult content
- Comments and likes can affect self-esteem
- Temptation to “go viral” adds pressure

What You Can Do:

- Use **Family Pairing** to link your account
 - Set **daily time limits** in the app
 - Turn on **Restricted Mode** to filter content
 - Disable **comments** on your child’s posts
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General Tips for All Devices

- Use built-in parental controls (Screen Time or Google Family Link)
 - Set **bedtimes for devices** and turn off notifications at night
 - Turn off **in-app purchases**
 - Check their **app downloads** regularly
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How to Talk to Your Child

- Ask open questions: *“What do you like most about TikTok?”*
 - Praise good choices: *“Thanks for showing me how to block someone!”*
 - Avoid blame — talk about working together
 - Let them teach you! Show interest in their apps
